

The Kaua'i Police Commission consists of seven members, appointed by the mayor, and approved by the Kaua'i County Council. The Commission holds regular public meetings at a designated time and place. The Kaua'i Police Commission is mandated with these responsibilities:

- Appoints and may remove the Chief of Police.
- Adopt such rules it may consider necessary for the conduct of its business and the regulation of matters relating to the goals and aims of the Kaua'i Police Department.
- Review the annual budget prepared by the Chief of Police and may make recommendations thereon to the Mayor.
- Receive, consider and investigate charges brought by the public against the conduct of the department or any of its members and submit a written report of its findings to the Chief of Police within 90 days.
- Refer all matters relating to the administration of the department to the Chief of Police.



Chief's Message



Aloha,

During 2008, the Kaua`i Police Department set many ambitious goals to provide the citizens and visitors of Kaua`i a more efficient and effective police department.

Recruitment of new police officers became our #1 priority because our vacancy rate of over 20 percent was the highest of all county police departments in the State. The hard work in promoting the department has led to the highest number of applicants, and although we were able to graduate only five officers in 2008, the benefits of our efforts will be reaped in 2009 and 2010. We anticipate that by early 2010, the majority of our vacancies will be filled, thus, leaving a vacancy rate of less than 5 percent.

Our youth programs are geared toward providing an environment of well-being to our children through sports activities spearheaded by the Kaua`i Police Activities League (K-PAL), under the direction of Officer Mark Ozaki. While K-PAL encourages teamwork, sportsmanship, parental involvement, commitment, and participation, this is only part of the overall objective. K-PAL first and foremost is a crime prevention program that discourages juvenile delinquency, while promoting a healthy lifestyle. In 2008 there were over 1000 participants and 250 volunteers island-wide. Some of the activities included flag football, Jiu Jitsu, Wrestling, Cheerleading, Basketball, and Boxing. This administration is committed to providing additional resources to continue the growth of K-PAL.

And while we continue to recruit new officers, and be involved in crime prevention programs, KPD still has to address the on-going concern with illegal drugs. In 2008, several Drug Trafficking Organizations (DTOs) were dismantled that culminated in the arrest of over twenty-two offenders, and the recovery of Crystal Methamphetamine (Ice), Cocaine, and Marijuana.

KPD has taken great strides in 2008 to improve both internally and externally the way in which we provide customer service. I am very proud of the employees of the Kaua`i Police Department. Their accomplishments show the finest example of professionalism in a law enforcement organization: committed to improving the quality of life for our citizens and visitors alike.

I would also like to thank Mayor Bernard P. Carvalho, Jr., Kaua`i County Council, and Police Commission for their continued and unwavering support.




POWERS, DUTIES, & FUNCTION

CHIEF OF POLICE

The Chief of Police plans, organizes, staffs, directs and controls the personnel and resources of the department and administers the department in a manner consistent with the Charter of the County of Kaua`i and the laws of the State of Hawai`i.

The Chief of Police is responsible for the following:

- Preservation of the public peace
- Protection of rights of persons and property
- Prevention of crime
- Detection and arrest of offenders
- Enforcement of all State laws and County ordinances and all rules and regulations made pursuant thereto; and
- Service of processes and notices in criminal and civil proceedings.

The Chief is also responsible for training, equipping, maintaining, and supervising a force of police officers and necessary staff.

The Chief of Police shall make such reports from time to time as the Police Commission shall require, and shall annually make a report to the Police Commission of the state of affairs and condition of the department.

CRIMINAL INTELLIGENCE UNIT

The Criminal Intelligence Unit of the Kaua`i Police Department works directly under the Office of the Chief of Police.

The primary goal of the unit is to combat organized crime activities in the County of Kaua`i and the State of Hawai`i. Such activities involve gambling, prostitution, loan sharking, illegal drug distribution, counterfeiting, extortion, and corruption of law enforcement officers and public officials. The unit also provides dignitary protection, monitors domestic and international terrorist activities, and serves as a vital support group for other bureaus within the department.

Lieutenant Henry Barriga was responsible for directing, planning, and coordinating overall activities of the unit.

Sergeant Michael Gordon and Officer Christopher Calio were tasked with overseeing field operations.

The Criminal Intelligence Unit is part of a statewide network of officers from various police departments and law enforcement agencies throughout the State. Officers work collectively investigating, collating, and analyzing information regarding organized crime and other criminal elements. Information is disseminated amongst the various agencies and action plans are developed accordingly.



ADMINISTRATIVE & TECHNICAL BUREAU

Assistant Chief Gordon Isoda was responsible for planning, directing, and coordinating activities within the Administrative and Technical Bureau in 2008 and Captain Scott Yagihara assisted in an administrative capacity.

The primary function of the bureau is to provide support services to other police units, by assisting them in meeting their own department objectives. Sections within A&T include Fiscal and Personnel, Records, Training, ID Tech, Research and Development, and Community Relations. Additional services are provided in Telecommunications, AFIS, Evidence, Firearms, and Fleet Maintenance.

FISCAL AND PERSONNEL

The fiscal section of the Administrative and Technical Bureau is staffed by Fiscal Officer Evelyn Branco, Personnel Assistant Vivian Akina, Account Clerk Yoko Watabe, Interim Fiscal Officer Patricia Layosa and Account Clerk Melanie Luis. This section's basic function is overseeing the fiscal and human resource functions of the department.

This support section assists Administration in coordinating and developing the operation budget, and provides technical support for all matters relating to accounting, purchasing, inventory, contracts, payroll and general fiscal management activities of the department. Personnel play a key role in assisting with the hiring process as part of an ongoing effort to fill vacancies.

Total expenditures for the year 2008 were \$18,000,583 compare to \$14,571,730 for the previous year. Salaries and salary related expenditures amounted to \$15,697,480 or 87% of total expenditures for the year.

The following chart depicts the department's sworn and civilian strength as of December 31, 2008.

The number of sworn positions stayed the same from 146 in 2007 to 146 in 2008. During this same period civilian positions increased from 61 to 76.

In 2008 CY the department hired seven (7) Police Service Officers, one (1) Public Safety Work I, and two (2) Radio Dispatchers, a Senior Clerk, a Clerk, a temporary Background Investigator and a temporary Fiscal Officer. In addition, six (6) School Crossing Guards were transferred to the Kauai Police Department from the Department of Finance.

During the year eleven (11) employees separated from service, two (2) retirements, seven (7) resignations and two (2) terminations.



RESEARCH AND DEVELOPMENT

The Research and Development Section consists of a Lieutenant and two Sergeants, one of whom also serves as the Community Relations Officer.

Lieutenant Dan Miyamoto is in command of the section, along with Sergeant Scott Kauai (Research and Development) and (Community Relations) currently vacant.

The section conducts project research, analyzes crime trends, coordinates the department's written directive system, procures uniforms and equipment, assists with department inventory, initiates and formulates contracts, coordinates physical examinations and urinalysis screening, establishes safety and health programs, obtains funding through various grants, and participates in community related service projects.

The most vital role of the section continues to be coordinating the recruitment, hiring, and background investigative screening process for both sworn and civilian employees.

Sergeant Scott Kauai continued to spearhead these efforts, implementing new ideas to improve the process. Departmentally, this included streamlining the transitional hiring and training requirements for experienced law enforcement officers from the mainland, conducting research to ensure hiring procedures were up to date and compliant with state, federal, and civil service standards, and initiating efforts that hopefully will result in future monetary recruitment incentives.

COMMUNITY RELATIONS

Lt. Dan Miyamoto was diverted from much of the traditional Community Relations tasks in order to address vital needs both within the bureau and departmentally as well.

Lt. Dan Miyamoto has also been handling much of the equipment needs for the department, and remained instrumental in drawing up various contracts for goods and services. In addition, he also served as the back up ID Tech, subject to emergency callouts as the need arose.

When time permitted, Lt. Dan Miyamoto continued to conduct station tours and presentations with various groups throughout the island. Topics included drug awareness and education, personnel safety awareness, and school safety. He also attended high school career fairs where emphasis was placed on early recruitment.

The Annual Special Olympics/Troy Barboza Torch Run, Cop on Top, and Kauai United Way drive were just some of the community fundraisers the section was involved with in 2008.

RECORDS, EVIDENCE, FIREARMS, CIVIL FINGERPRINTING, AFIS SECTION, LEGAL DOCUMENTS, STATISTICS & SEX OFFENDER REGISTRY

Ms. Estelle Furuike served as the Records Unit Supervisor and Custodian of Records in CY2008. Ms. Furuike directed a staff that consisted of the following personnel: Ms. Audrey Silva, Police Records Analyst, Ms. Joni Arakaki, Reports Reviewer II; Ms. Allison Ageno, Warrants Clerk; Ms. Emily Fabro, Weapons Registration Clerk; Mr. Scott Yamaguchi, ID Technician I, Ms. Taytralyn K. Nebre Police Evidence Clerk; and Ms. Eunice Apeles, Police Evidence Custodian.

One of the primary responsibilities dealt with maintaining records and services consistent with the Uniform Crime Reporting Standards, Federal, State, and County laws, as well as departmental rules, regulations and policies.

Overall, the section is responsible for the following processes: Legal documents (warrants, subpoenas, summons, and TRO's), firearms registration and permits, evidence receiving and storage, civil employment fingerprinting services, insurance requests, counter service and funds, report duplication, police/criminal record checks, updating public access computer(s) for criminal conviction and sex offender registry inquiries, expungement orders, NCIC (National Crime Information Center) records management system data entry & maintenance, maintaining individual arrest records and all police reports filed with the department.

Evidence items are accounted for from initial receipt to final disposition, including maintaining proper chain of custody procedures when items are sent for testing or used during trial.

The AFIS (Automated Fingerprint Identification System) computer specialist helps identify suspects from latent fingerprints recovered at crime scenes. First-time and repeat offenders are processed and maintained in a statewide AFIS database.

The FBI's National Crime Information Center (NCIC) mandates an audit every two years for users of their system. The Police Records Analyst, Weapons Registration Clerk, and Records Unit Supervisor are involved in the operational and

administrative audit for the Uniform Crime Reporting System, NCIC, and NICS for firearm permits, and CJIS Security.

TRAINING SECTION

Acting Lieutenant Ezra Kanoho was in command of the Training Section, which continued progress in improving services and programs to address areas of increased liability risk for the Kauai Police Department. The section also sought to provide quality training programs for personnel in an effort to keep up with the continuously advancing technological field of criminal investigations.

**IDENTIFICATION & CRIME SCENE
TECHNOLOGY**

Lieutenant Paul Kanoho was in charge of
the department's Identification & Crime
Scene Technology Section, and also
oversaw activities involving the police fleet
and equipment maintenance unit.

Always "on call," Lt. Kanoho responded to
numerous cases throughout the year,
including murder, robbery, arson, sex assault
and traffic (fatal) accidents.

The basic function of the section is to
support patrol and detective units by
providing photography, latent fingerprint
(dusting, ninhydrin, and superglue), gunshot
residue swabbing, alternative light source
scanning, DNA, trace particle, and evidence
collection services.

**POLICE FLEET AND EQUIPMENT
MAINTENANCE**

Mr. Michael Layosa continued to be a
valuable asset to the department as the
Police Fleet and Equipment Maintenance
Coordinator.



Mr. Layosa utilizes an in-depth service plan to ensure all police vehicles are running safely and efficiently. An experienced mechanic, machinist, welder, and equipment operator, Mr. Layosa performs vehicle maintenance work on a daily basis. He also works closely with both County and private auto service outlets when more extensive vehicle repairs are needed.

In addition to fleet responsibilities, Mr. Layosa operates and maintains other types of department equipment, including the mobile command vehicle, forklift, emergency generators and lighting.

TELECOMMUNICATIONS 2008

The Public Safety Telecommunications Administrator, Dexter Takashima, served as the overall technical system manager and administrator responsible for the technical planning, direction, coordination, operations and maintenance of Kauai County's island wide public safety 800 MHZ SMARTNET Type II simulcast (analog) trunk radio communications system, 6 GHZ "backbone" microwave system, KCDA MOSCAD siren command and control system, five remote primary trunk radio repeater sites, a new west Kauai single site 3 repeater trunk radio system, a single site analog P25 capable 800 MHz repeater system, in excess of 900+ radio units consisting of a fleet of portable, mobile and control ("base") station radios. He also served as the Mayor's representative on the Governor's state Wireless Enhanced 911 (E911) Board and supported KPD as one of the facility managers and was the telecommunications administrator responsible for the maintenance of the facility digital EPBX telephone system, the E911 CML telephone system, facility utility systems, security access and alarm systems, digital surveillance video camera system,

communication cable plant, and other specialized telecommunication components and projects for the Kauai Police Department (KPD), Kauai Civil Defense Agency (KCDA) and Office of the Prosecuting Attorney (OPA).

The following projects were undertaken in 2008:

- Two additional island wide 800 MHz trunk radio channels (Homeland Security Grant). Project was completed on December 31, 2008.
- Completed negotiations for an annual recurring service contract with Hawaiian Telcom to maintain the digital telephone systems at the Waimea & Hanalei substations and the Kapaa mini-substation, July 2008.
- Upgrade of the KPD/EOC/OPA building security access system (Homeland Security grant) was completed June 2008.
- Upgrade of the KPD/EOC/OPA building security surveillance camera system, adding 13 new cameras and replacing the analog recorder to state-of-the-art DVR system (Homeland Security grant), was completed July 2008.
- Assisted in the design of the communications suite in the KPD Incident Command Center vehicle (ICCV). (Homeland Security grant) Project completed September 30, 2008).
- Motorola completed the retuning, equipment replacement, flashing of all necessary radios, provided the



radio equipment inventory, the acceptance testing and coverage mapping of the entire island by December 31, 2008. The County, Motorola and our sub-contractors are in the True up phase where the County and its contractors follow up with laboriously categorizing and annotating all of the labor hours, travel, conference calls, contracts, radio equipment, test equipment, temporary equipment necessary to make the transition work effectively minimizing any down time, and a million other miscellaneous little things that it took literally nearly 3 years to put together to make the project flow without a single radio system failure and invoicing all of this to Sprint Nextel for payment as mandated by the Federal Communications Commission..

- Completed a negotiated contract for an annual recurring radio service agreement with Pacific Wireless Communications LLC to service and maintain all of the portable, mobile and control station radio equipment for the Kaua'i Police Department.
- Completed a negotiated contract for an annual recurring radio service agreement with Motorola Inc. to service and maintain the County of Kauai Motorola Smartnet II Trunk radio system infrastructure equipment and components, including the 6 GHz microwave system and the MOSCAD siren and control radio system.
- Mr. Takashima served for an additional term on the Wireless Enhance 911 Board commencing on

June 30, 2008 and ending April 2009 as the Kauai PSAP representative. He assisted in the planning and coordination of the State of Hawai'i Wireless Enhanced 911 Public Safety Answering Point (PSAP) E911 dispatch centers improvements.

- Assigned by Honorable Mayor Bryan Baptiste to represent Kaua'i on the statewide 700 MHz Operations Committee and the Hawai'i Wireless Interoperability Network



INVESTIGATIVE SERVICES BUREAU

Assistant Roy Asher was in command of the Investigative Services Bureau in 2008. The bureau is comprised of experienced and seasoned veterans who have received advanced and specialized training in various disciplines. They are tasked to investigate complex investigations, both self initiated and as follow-up on those referred by Patrol Services.

The bureau is divided into three primary Sections: Crimes against Person, Property Crimes, and Vice Section. Support personnel include the bureau's Juvenile Counselor, Domestic Violence Coordinator and two support Clerks.

The Bureau also oversees the operations of the following subunits and programs; Canine Handler, D.A.R.E. and G. R. E. A. T. officers, Crisis Negotiators Team and the Special Services Team.

CRIMES AGAINST PERSON SECTION

The Crimes against Persons Section was under the command of Lieutenant Jon Takamura. The section has an allotment of seven detectives, who are responsible for the investigation of crimes committed against persons such as Assaults, Sex Assault, Robbery and Murders, involving both adults and Juveniles. The primary Fraud and money laundering cases (white collar) investigator is also attached to the section.

PROPERTY CRIME SECTION

The Property Crimes Section was under the command of Lieutenant Dan Fort. The section has an allotment of six detectives, who primarily investigate all property crimes committed by or against both adults and juveniles. The Section also has a Youth Services Program. The section continued to focus much of its attention toward deterring drug and gang activity among juveniles through specialized programs such as D.A.R.E. and G.R.E.A.T. which had its primary focus on third, fifth and eighth graders, with each program culminating in graduation ceremonies attended by parents, faculty, and KPD officers.

YOUTH SERVICES SECTION- JUVENILE COUNSELOR

Ms. Claire Ueno continued to make a positive impact in the community as the department's juvenile counselor. In 2008 she served as the overall coordinator for status offenses, which includes runaway, curfew, truancy and P.I.N.S.

"Teen Court" is another important program overseen by Ms. Ueno. Since its inception seven years ago, it has evolved into a viable Family Court alternative and diversion from the Juvenile Justice System for first time youth offenders.

Ms. Ueno is a vital component of the Maile-Amber Alert response unit, and has been involved with both adult and juvenile missing person investigations.



**DOMESTIC VIOLENCE
INTERVENTION COORDINATOR
(DVIC)**

Ms. Stacy Sibayan continued to serve as the department’s Domestic Violence Intervention Coordinator or DVIC for the first part of 2008 but unfortunately left for another position in the private Sector. Her position remained vacant for the remainder of the year. Her primary area of responsibility is as special case manager for all incidents of family, child and elder abuse, as well as protective order violation.

Her duties included screening family violence cases and working closely with victims to initiate/facilitate needed services and avenues of support.

During her tenure she responded to crime scenes, hospitals, and the family violence shelter to assist with investigations.

VICE SECTION

Is responsible for investigating and enforcing all laws relating to illegal drug activity, the Narcotic/Vice Unit was under the command of Lieutenant Eric Shibuya. The unit was comprised of 15 positions (1-Lieutenant, 2 Sergeants, 12 Officers/Investigators). Due to current staffing shortages the unit operated with only six Officers.

Crystal meth-amphetamine or “ice” continued as a primary focal point for the unit.

Marijuana eradication projects, also known as “Green Harvest” operations, continued to have a strong impact on the plants illegal cultivation. Utilizing helicopters and employing rappelling techniques, officers worked throughout the year with federal and

state agencies in a concerted effort to curtail illegal growing efforts.

Narcotics/Vice officers were also assigned to various federal and state task force units, including HIDTA (High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area), DCE/SP (Domestic Cannabis Eradication/Suppression Program), HNTF (Hawaii Narcotic Task Force), SMETF 9 (State Marijuana Eradication Task Force), and the statewide Clandestine Lab Task Force.

CRISIS NEGOTIATORS TEAM

The Crisis Negotiators Team (CNT) is comprised of officers from both Patrol Services Bureau and Investigative Services Bureau, with operational responsibilities falling under the command of the ISB Assistant Chief

The team was under the command of Lt. Jon Takamura which had five members. The members are trained in a peaceful mediation of crisis situation. The team is summoned to all hostage situations, suicide attempts, barricaded subjects, and other crisis required negotiations.

SPECIAL SERVICES TEAM

The Special Services Team (SST) is comprised of officers from all three bureaus of the department, with operational responsibilities falling under the command of the ISB Assistant Chief.

The team was under the command of Sergeant Michael Gordon. The Special Services Team is activated when acute situations arise requiring special police consideration. Cases include hostage and barricaded suspect incidents, area and building sweeps for dangerous perpetrators, and high-risk search warrant entries.

To be a member of the SST, officers must be able to meet and maintain qualification and eligibility standards in areas that include overall physical fitness, firearms/weapons proficiency, and rappelling.



PATROL SERVICES BUREAU

The Patrol Services Bureau has always been the “backbone” of the Kaua’i Police Department, and without exception is the most crucial element of the entire organization. In terms of manpower, patrol is the largest of the three bureaus, with nearly two-thirds of the department’s sworn personnel comprising its ranks.

Assistant Chief Clayton Arinaga commanded the bureau up until November 30, 2008. Captain Alejandro Quibilan has since served as Acting Assistant Chief since. Assistant Chief Arinaga’s retirement in November 2008. Acting Assistant Chief Quibilan was in command of the bureau with Acting Captain Mark Scribner assisting in an operational capacity. Sergeant Eric Kauai is the Acting Patrol Administrative Lieutenant who is in charge of Communications and the Detention Center/Holding Facility.

Dedicated patrol support staff included Michelle Albarado, Clerk Supervisor; Amy Agcaoili, Police Records Clerk; and three District Senior Clerks.

The Patrol Services Bureau is responsible for the following:

- Preservation of the Public Peace
- Prevention of Crime
- Identification and Apprehension of Offenders
- Enforcement of all State Laws and County Ordinances
- Protection of Rights

The bureau is divided into three main districts, Hanalei, Lihue, and Waimea. A Lieutenant or District Commander is given overall responsibility for each region, and is assisted by three Sergeants. The Sergeants are responsible for the immediate supervision of a squad comprised of up to eight officers. In addition, each district receives assistance from an assigned Senior Clerk.

The patrol bureau also has three vital support sections: Traffic Safety Unit (TSU), Emergency Dispatch-Communications, and Detention Center/Holding Facility.

In the later part of 2008 Patrol Service Bureau received 6 Police Recruits from training which they were assigned to the various Districts.

LIHUE DISTRICT (Central Kaua`i)

Lieutenant Sherwin Perez served as the Lihue District Commander. District Sergeants included Todd Tanaka, Trent Shimabukuro and Glenn Morita. Mr. Michael Lane provided clerical and administrative support.

The Lihue district encompasses the central, heavily populated region of Kaua`i, extending from Kapaa Town to the “Tunnel of Trees” near Koloa. The larger population and higher concentration of businesses, government offices, transportation and special event venues typically equates to a greater caseload for Lihue officers.





Kokee State Parks (West Kaua`i) and Niihau.

Many of the officers assigned to the district were born and raised within various communities there, and have developed special relationships with members of the community. This element works well in cultivating resources leading to vital pieces of information needed to solve crimes.

The district continued to serve as a proving ground for newly graduated recruits, who along with their Field Training Officers are routinely assigned to its sectors for increased case exposure.

Community events for the year included:

- Kaua`i Hospice-Fourth of July Celebration
- Annual Lihue Business Association Christmas Parade
- Visitor Industry Charity Walk, Special Olympics Torch Run, and multiple non-profit fundraisers
- Various community/town meetings

WAIMEA DISTRICT (South Shore to West Kaua`i)

Lieutenant Danilo Abadilla served as the District Commander in Waimea. Assisting with supervisory responsibilities were Sergeants Bernard Purisima and Vicki Fonoimoana. Mr. Jay Watanabe, Senior Clerk, provided administrative and clerical support

Geographically, Waimea is the largest of all the patrol districts, spanning from Koloa and Poipu (South Kaua`i) to Waimea, Polihale,



Community and Special Event Projects in 2008' included:

- Career day events at various Schools
- Waimea Town Christmas Parade
- Waimea, Hanapepe, and Koloa Town Celebrations
- Volunteer work at carnivals and community fundraisers

HANALEI DISTRICT (East Kaua`i to North Shore)

Lieutenant Michael Contrades served as the District Commander in Hanalei, Sergeant Scott Brede, Sergeant Bryson Ponce and Sergeant Sandy Wakumoto were assigned to the district as platoon supervisors. Senior Clerk Geary Masada assisted in an administrative capacity.



Hanalei district boundaries span from Kapaa Town (East Kauai), to Hanalei and Haena (North Kauai), with much of the residential base situated in the Kapaa, Anahola, Kilauea, Princeville, and Hanalei Townships.



Officers remained diligent in traffic enforcement throughout the year, and also participated in special enforcement projects for Unauthorized Entry into a Motor Vehicle, illegal camping and trespassing.

Officers were also busy in the community helping with special projects and events, some of which included:

- Illegal camping and trespassing enforcement projects
- Drug, safety, and police awareness presentations at various schools
- Attending and participating in neighborhood meetings and fundraisers.

TRAFFIC SAFETY UNIT

The Traffic Safety Unit (TSU) was under the command of Lieutenant Mark Scribner, and assisted in a supervisory capacity by Sergeant Rob Gausepohl.

Normally comprised of seven officers, promotions and subsequent reassignments reduced the unit's number to five.

Officers James Miller, Ray Takekawa, Jason Overmyer, Harold Venneman and Vernon Scribner used their specialized training in traffic accident reconstruction and advanced investigative techniques throughout the year.

TSU officers remained “on call” during the year, responding to accidents resulting in fatalities or serious injuries. The unit assumed responsibility for these investigations and subsequent case filing with the Office of the Prosecuting Attorney.

A proactive approach to traffic safety remained a high priority, as each officer was also tasked with enforcing traffic laws and ordinances, including speeding, seatbelt, and OVUII.

COMMUNICATIONS/DISPATCH

Supervisor Kathleen Langtad was in charge of the section, which had a personnel allotment of one Supervisor and twenty dispatchers. There were eighteen full-time dispatchers. Virtually every case handled by officers was initiated through dispatch. In that regard, each dispatcher continued to play a vital role in the quality and level of service provided to the public.

The ability of a dispatcher to remain calm, think clearly, and make proper decisions is often overlooked, but such attributes proved invaluable to those whose safety and well-being were ensured because of it.

Dispatchers received training in the Computer Automated Dispatch/Records Management System (CAD/RMS), which is expected to enhance operational (dispatch) capabilities and streamline record-keeping tasks.





DETENTION CENTER (Holding Facility)

Supervisory responsibilities for the Kaua'i Police Detention Center rested on the shoulders of Sergeant Eric Kauai. There are ten allotted positions assigned to cell block and there are four full-time Public Safety Workers- Collette Saiki, Ernest Ganiron, Andrew Muraoka, and Roy Waskoviak were assigned to the unit.

Supplemental staffing came via way of sworn police officers working on an overtime basis.

A major highlight was the National Telecommunications Week - Annual Dispatch Banquet. Held in honor of the entire section, it recognized the important contribution of dispatchers in KPD's effort to serve the public.



The facility is comprised of a fenced in carport with electronic gates, an intercom/communication system, video surveillance cameras and monitors, showers, restrooms, separate adult and juvenile intake areas, a central booking and processing room, visitation room, six holding cells, and a main control center.



2008 HSLEOA OFFICER OF THE YEAR



**OFFICER ELLIOTT KE
PATROL BUREAU**

Officer Elliott Ke represented the Kaua'i Police Department as the Hawaii State Law Enforcement Officer of Year for 2008 and Kaua'i Top Cop for 2008.

Officer Elliott Ke simultaneously investigated two major drug trafficking organization in 2007. The first operation led to dismantling of the largest marijuana growing operation to be prosecuted in the history of State of Hawai'i. The second operation led to the dismantling of the largest methamphetamine distribution network on Kaua'i with ties to the outer islands and mainland. Although Officer Ke will credit the operations success to the many other officers and agencies involved, he initiated the cases, gathered the information and collaborated with the Drug Enforcement Administration to make them possible.

Officer Ke's is hard work, dedication and personal sacrifices prevented \$5.9 million dollars worth of marijuana and over \$1 million dollars in methamphetamine from being distributed on our island and community. The complexity of these cases and the coordination involved between federal and state agencies made his efforts extraordinary.

During this period of time, Officer Ke was also certified as a Rappel Master and worked to improve the Narcotic Unit Rappel Program by researching new techniques, updating equipment and ensuring that personnel were properly trained and certified. Officer Ke served as the Officer in Charge of the Unit and supervised other officers well, displaying professionalism and fairness when dealing with personnel issues.

PATROL BUREAU**

Officer Nitta possesses the traits and characteristics of a model officer: dedicated, integrity, respectful, professional, humble, vigilant, and fit for duty, to name a few. He has been a mainstay officer throughout his 15 years with the Kaua'i Police Department. He is a fine example of promoting our mission statement, truly projecting the "Aloha Spirit" and is committed to enhancing the quality of life for our residents. The values of Pono: Respect, Integrity, and Professionalism describes Officer Nitta well, and are truly manifested in him. - He is highly respected by his fellow officers.
- Though not big in stature, Officer Nitta's physical condition and workout routine has earned him the reputation of being of the strongest officers, pound for pound, that KPD has ever employed.



- In his 15 years, Officer Nitta has taken a total of 4 days sick leave (pretty amazing feat).


