The Community Engagement Section also revived the Junior Police Academy, a five-day summer program for high school students that had been on hold for six years. The academy provided students with a detailed overview of the criminal justice system, including crime scene investigation, forensic science, firearms safety, and first aid. Officer Johnathan Anderson played a crucial role in restarting the program, overseeing coordination and planning. Several participants expressed interest in pursuing careers in law enforcement because of their previous experience.	
	The Touch-A-Truck event is a free community event gathering that allows families to get up close to emergency and municipal vehicles and meet the everyday heroes who operate them. The event encouraged positive interactions between the community and various emergency service professionals. As the section supervisor, Lieutenant Matthew Tavares played a key role in planning Touch-A-Truck and provided strong leadership and effective management across multiple community programs. His operational coordination and dedication to youth development were essential to the success of each initiative.
