Employees of the Month February 2026	<p>Reading the Commendation Report for Sergeant Brian Silva was Acting Lieutenant/Lihue District Commander Michael Nii.</p> <p>On January 12, 2026, officers responded to a high-risk incident involving a female suspect armed with a large knife near a construction site close to Lihue Airport. The female barricaded herself in her vehicle after reckless driving and threatening workers. Officers confirmed she was armed and tried to de-escalate; when initial attempts at communication failed, they established a perimeter and called Sergeant Brian Silva.</p> <p>Sergeant Silva used his extensive crisis negotiation experience to guide officers toward a calmer approach while ensuring everyone's safety. He ultimately negotiated with the suspect, leading to her peaceful surrender without injury or excessive force.</p> <p>Sergeant Silva was praised for his leadership, control, and tactical decision-making and recognized for mentoring junior officers and fostering a team-based, compassionate response.</p> <p>Chair Yoshida opened the floor for public testimony.</p>

	<p><u>Public Testimony</u></p> <p>Bruce Hart – After listening to the Commendation Report for Sergeant Silva, the one thing he noted was his advice to his team to take a softer approach. He quoted Proverbs 15: "A soft answer turns away wrath, but a grievous word stirs up anger." This demonstrates maturity and experience on Sergeant Silva's part; it shows that he knows what works in each situation and that he's glad Sergeant Silva was there to defuse it.</p> <p>The Commissioners and Chief Ke took turns praising Sergeant Silva's maturity and extensive negotiation experience, which led to a positive outcome. Chief Ke awarded him a certificate for exemplary and outstanding service.</p> <p>Lieutenant/Acting Captain Philip Banquel read the Commendation Report for Officer Joridan Sele.</p> <p>Officer Sele recently transferred from the Honolulu Police Department to Kauai and started patrol in June 2025. Despite taking family and sick leave, he made a significant impact in about six months.</p> <p>He was recognized for his outstanding achievements, including 107 physical arrests resulting in 128 criminal charges, ranging from felonies to misdemeanors. He specializes in locating and apprehending individuals with outstanding warrants – 80 warrant arrests, often involving dangerous and evasive suspects.</p>

	<p>Notably, in September 2025, he located and peacefully arrested a suspect with a \$50,000 warrant after negotiating with the individual, who had locked himself in a bathroom. In October 2025, he arrested a suspect wanted for arson, reckless endangerment, and domestic violence after persistent efforts. Then, in November 2025, he pursued and arrested a suspect in a stolen-vehicle case, charging the suspect with multiple felonies.</p> <p>The Commissioners and Interim Police Chief Ke took turns praising Officer Sele for his motivation, positive influence on colleagues, and support for his family, highlighting that he's an inspiration and a team player.</p> <p><u>Public Testimony</u></p> <p>Bruce Hart – Officer Sele is an ideal fit and serves as an inspiration to KPD officers. He emphasized that he views the KPD as a team where, when one officer succeeds, everyone can take pride in that achievement. Let's all act as coaches and support one another because together, we can make a positive difference in people's lives.</p> <p>Sergeant Brian Silva congratulated Officer Sele on his outstanding achievements since joining the Kauai Police Department. He mentioned that when he heard about Officer Sele transferring over to Kauai, he made some calls and heard a lot of great things about him. He was excited to have Officer Sele join his squad. He wished him all the best.</p> <p>Chair Yoshida asked Officer Sele if he could say a few words.</p>

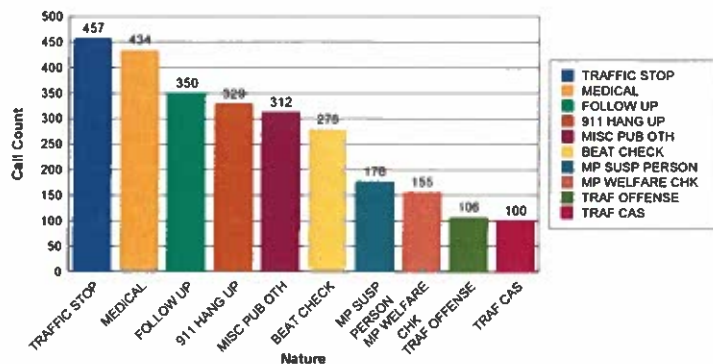

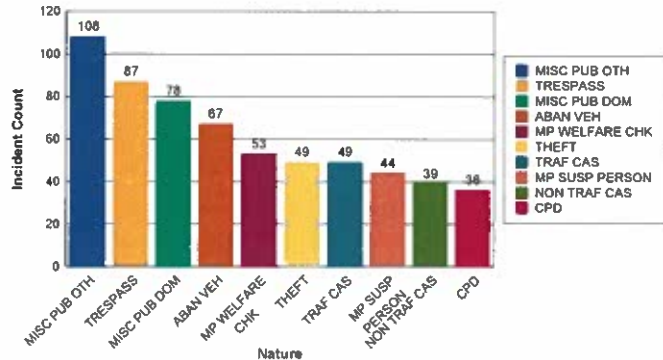

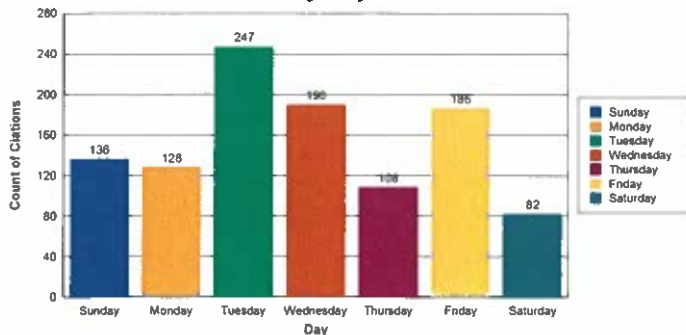

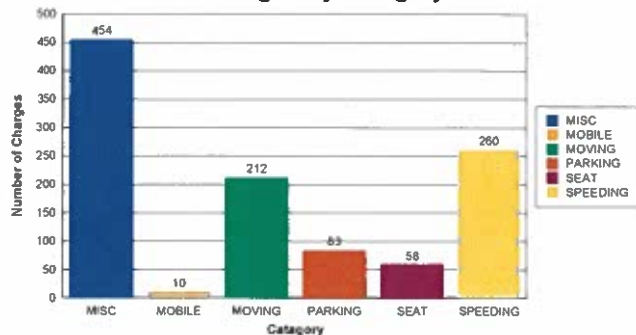

Internationally, such actions may contravene the UN Charter's prohibition on aggression unless in self-defense.  The U.S. Constitution divides war powers: Congress declares war (Art. I, §8), while the President is Commander-in-Chief (Art. II, §2). Presidents can initiate limited actions without approval, often for defense or under statutes like the 2001 Authorization for Use of Military Force (AUMF), which has been invoked over 40 times for operations in 19 countries as of 2023. - **War Powers Resolution (1973):** Requires notification within 48 hours of hostilities; forces withdraw after 60 days (plus 30-day extension) unless Congress authorizes. Actions are permissible if defensive or under AUMF, but critics argue Iran's non-attack on U.S. soil violates this, similar to Reagan's 1983 Grenada invasion or Clinton's 1999 Kosovo actions without approval. ## U.S. Laws Potentially Violated - **Constitution (Art. I, §8):** Unilateral offensive war without declaration violates congressional prerogative, as seen in over 125 undeclared military engagements since 1789. - **War Powers Resolution:** Extension beyond 60 days without approval is a violation; no formal authorization passed. Presidents have bypassed it in 70+ instances, with courts often deeming disputes non-justiciable (e.g., Campbell v. Clinton, 2000). - **No AUMF for Iran:** 2001/2002 AUMFs target al-Qaeda/Iraq, not Iran; stretching them is legally contested, as in the 2018 Yemen debate where WPR was invoked to limit involvement. Pete Hegseth, as Secretary of War (confirmed Jan. 2025), advised on operations but faces no direct statutory violation unless aiding unauthorized acts. ## International Laws, UN, and Treaties Violated - **UN Charter (Art. 2(4)):** Prohibits force against territorial integrity except self-defense (Art. 51) or UNSC approval. Strikes qualify as aggression under UNGA Res. 3314 (1974), similar to the 2003 Iraq invasion condemned by some as violating international law. - **Geneva Conventions:** If conflict escalates, violations (e.g., civilian targeting) are war crimes; over 1,000 civilian deaths in Iraq 2003 highlighted such risks. - **No UNSC Resolution:** Actions lack multilateral backing, violating collective security, akin to the 2011 Libya intervention where WPR compliance was debated. U.S. claims self-defense against Iranian proxies, but preemptive strikes are disputed. ## Mechanisms to Try for Treason Treason (Art. These documents, hosted at <https://jmail.world/> (a searchable archive of 1.4+ million emails, flight logs, and files from DOJ releases), reveal patterns of elite-enabled human trafficking that demand local law enforcement scrutiny. While the files substantiate a federal sex-trafficking operation involving minors, they also highlight unchecked power among high-profile figures, including recent allegations against President Donald Trump. This impunity contributes to a broader climate of moral erosion, rising crime in Hawai'i, and economic instability exacerbated by the ongoing Middle East conflict — which some view as a distraction from domestic accountability. I call on the Commission to ****not sit on this intel****. Instead, use it to enhance training, investigations, and multi-agency collaboration. Crime in Hawai'i is rising (violent crime up 16.4% in 2024 per USAFacts), and the war's disruptions could worsen it through supply chain breakdowns, higher prices, and increased desperation-driven offenses. Below, I outline the relevance, key intel, and actionable steps in bullet points and numbered lists for clarity. All links are clickable for immediate review.

As of March 6, 2026, the U.S. Department of Justice (DOJ) has continued releasing tranches of documents related to Jeffrey Epstein under the Epstein Files Transparency Act, with the most recent updates occurring on March 5, 2026. These include previously withheld or missing files that reference allegations against President Donald Trump. However, it's important to note that the majority of mentions involving Trump in the Epstein files are uncorroborated, denied by Trump and his administration, and do not include verified evidence of wrongdoing. Below is a factual summary based on the latest public releases and reporting.
Latest Release (March 5-6, 2026): Newly Published Files with Allegations Against Trump The DOJ released additional documents on March 5, 2026, after investigations by NPR and other outlets revealed

These files include FBI summaries from three 2019 interviews with an unidentified woman from South Carolina who alleged that Epstein introduced her to Trump in the 1980s (when she was between 13 and 15 years old) and that Trump sexually assaulted her in New York or New Jersey. Reporting from outlets like the Miami Herald notes that no extensive criminal history beyond minor theft charges could be verified, and some DOJ sources reportedly found her claims credible during initial reviews. Trump has repeatedly denied any involvement in Epstein's crimes, emphasizing on Truth Social that he "wasn't friendly" with Epstein and highlighting his administration's actions against sex trafficking.
