The *Kaua'i Police Commission* consists of seven members, appointed by the mayor, and confirmed by the Kaua'i County Council. The Commission holds regular public meetings at a designated time and place. The *Kaua'i Police Commission* is mandated with these responsibilities:

- Appoints and may remove the Chief of Police.
- Adopt such rules it may consider necessary for the conduct of its business and the regulation of matters relating to the goals and aims of the Kaua'i Police Department.
- Review the annual budget prepared by the Chief of Police and may make recommendations thereon to the Mayor.
- Receive, consider and investigate charges brought by the public against the conduct of the department or any of its members and submit a written report of its findings to the Chief of Police within 90 days.
- Refer all matters relating to the administration of the department to the Chief of Police.

MESSAGE FROM THE CHIEF

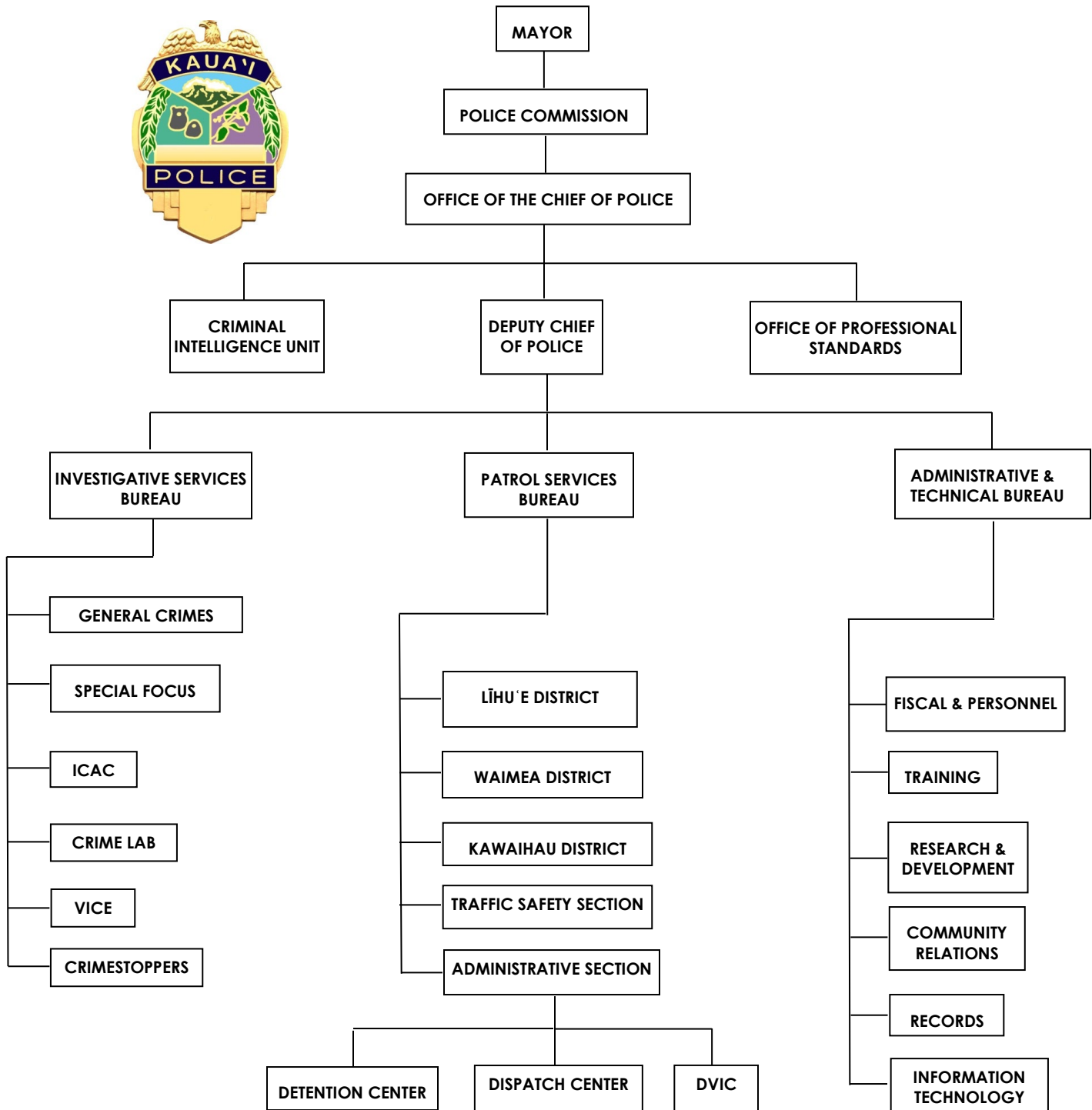

POWERS, DUTIES and FUNCTION

OFFICE OF THE CHIEF OF POLICE

Direct the operation and administration of the department. Responsible for the preservation of the public peace, protection of the rights of persons and property, prevention of crime, detection and arrest of offenders, and the enforcement and prevention of violations of state laws, county ordinances and rules and regulations.

Office of Professional Standards

Responsible for the development, implementation and maintenance of the department's written policies and procedures. Maintain and monitor CALEA accreditation proofs of compliance. Conduct staff inspections, fair and impartial investigations into complaints concerning the conduct and action of the department's employees and administer the drug testing program. Administrate, audit, and control body worn camera systems and the release of recordings in accordance with established policy and law. Administrate, monitor and control facility access.

Criminal Intelligence Unit

Gather, analyze, and disseminate data to prevent and control organized crime activities, deter and acts of terrorism, provide dignitary protection, and serve as a vital support group of other Bureaus.

ADMINISTRATIVE & TECHNICAL BUREAU

Plan, direct, and coordinate the clerical, technical, and logistical support of department.

Fiscal Section

Prepare and manage the department's annual operating budget, prepare payroll, responsible for procurement, accounts payable, grants financial management, and the department's inventory. Manage the personnel matters within the department in conjunction with the Department of Human Resources. Manage the County False Alarm Ordinance.

Records Section

Maintain a records system of all police reports to include review and retrieval of documents. Responsible for the processing of legal papers for service, expungement orders, police/criminal record checks, insurance request, firearms registration, fingerprint processing, the receipt and storage of evidence and found property, and counter service funds.

Research & Development Section

Conduct research and special studies relating to crime trends, new equipment, technology, and techniques. Conduct consistent, thorough background investigations on all individuals applying for employment with the Police Department and some positions within the County of Kaua'i. Procure and issue uniform and equipment to police personnel. Manage the Peer Support Unit and Chaplaincy Corps. Maintain and update the Department website and social media venues. Coordinate Color and Honor Guard ceremonies.

Oversee the management of the department's fleet of vehicles, trailers, and emergency response equipment. Manage and train the Communication Support Team, as well as facilitate and respond to call outs.

Community Relations/Kauai Police Activities League Unit

Develop and maintain the department's community relations to promote public understanding and awareness of police operations. Responsibilities include facilitating the assignment of speakers requested by various organizations, coordinate special awards/events and conduct various community programs like the Citizens Police Academy and Police Exam Prep Course.

Oversee the Kauai Police Activities League (KPAL). Goal is to reduce juvenile crime and violence, provide positive role models, facilitate positive and creative activities and provide a safe place to congregate.

School Resources Officer Unit

Prevent school violence, implement educational programs and develop a close police-student relationship to deter drug and gang activity among juveniles. Create a positive relationship between youth and police officers with the hope of extending that positive relationship into adulthood. Teach the Drug Abuse Resistance and Education (DARE) program to all 5th and 7th grade students on the island of Kauai.

Training Section

Review, evaluate and research training needs to improve services and programs of the department. Provide training to all departmental personnel. Oversee the Field Training Officers program that provides practical training and evaluation of recruit officers in the field after they completed police academy. Coordinate training request from outside agencies and organizations. Conduct Active Shooter/Assault Trainings for various organizations.

INVESTIGATIVE SERVICES BUREAU

Plan, organize, and coordinate the activities of the General Crimes, Special Focus, Vice Section, Crime Scene and Laboratory Unit, and Sexual Assault Nurse Examiners section. Investigate all criminal and non-criminal matters referred to the Bureau, detect and apprehend suspects. In addition, oversee the Crisis Negotiator Team (CNT) and the Special Response Team (SRT); team members comprised of specially selected and trained officers from various Bureaus.

General Crimes Section

Conduct specialized and detailed police investigations including the detection and apprehension of suspects. Conduct crime scene processing/examination and collection of physical evidence. Perform comprehensive investigative services, case management and victim support. Conduct informational meetings for community groups to increase public awareness.

Major Crime/Homicide Unit

Investigate violent crime cases involving threatening, robbery, extortion, kidnapping, assaults, arson, missing persons, unattended or suspicious deaths.

Sex Crime Unit

Investigate crimes of sexual assault, molestation, and indecent exposure cases involving adult and minor victims and suspects. Coordinate outside support groups and agency services.

Property Crime Unit

Investigate burglaries, thefts, unauthorized entry into motor vehicle and all other property related offenses.

Crime Scene and Laboratory Unit

Conducts advanced crime scene processing, prepares detailed reports on the observations and activities at the scene for police investigators, testifies in court regarding the findings and processing methods used at the scene. Provides technical assistance and training, evaluates and analyzes evidence, interprets results related to the physical evidence recovered from crime scenes.

Sexual Assault Nurse Examiners

Conducts sexual assault evidentiary exams for rape victims. SANE nurses are specially trained in the medical, psychological, and forensic examination of a sexual assault victim. SANE Nurses are on call 24-hours day to respond to sexual assault investigations when called upon by Detectives.

Special Focus Section

Conduct specialized and detailed police investigations of white collar crimes, to include financial fraud and forgery, credit card fraud, and computer and internet crimes.

Vice Section

Investigate narcotics, morals and gambling offenses and other organized criminal activities. Prevent criminal activities through arrest, interdiction, eradication, and public awareness.

PATROL SERVICES BUREAU

Provide services for the preservation of the public peace, prevention of crimes, protection of life and property, enforcement of state laws and county ordinances, and the apprehension and custody of offenders. Participate in neighborhood meetings and develop problem solving activities within the communities.

Administrative Section

Plan, direct, coordinate, and review the operations of the communication center and intake/detention facility according to departmental policies, procedures, and standards. Evaluate services, identify the needs and/or deficiencies, implement solutions and recommend budgetary and staff needs.

Communication Center

Serve as the primary public safety answering point (PSAP) for all 9-1-1 calls on Kaula'i. Receive all calls for police, fire, and ambulance assistance and dispatch the appropriate personnel while providing radio communication to all field units.

Intake/Detention Facility

Serve as the central booking and holding facility for detainees. Provide a variety of enforcement and protective services for the processing, detention, and transfer of detainees.

Field Operation Section

Plan, direct, coordinate, and review the operations of the Kawaihau, Lihue, and Waimea Districts

Provide the staffing to 1) patrol designated areas, 2) investigate all complaints, such as misdemeanors, felonies, and traffic violations, and 3) enforce all laws and ordinances.

Traffic Safety Section

Investigate motor vehicle collisions involving death, critical injury, or felony traffic crimes. Enforce traffic laws, conduct in-service training and coordinate and manage the Highway Safety grants to help reduce traffic fatalities and enhance public safety.. Responsible to identify the derelict and abandoned vehicles county-wide and the removal of vehicles for disposal or storage.



YEAR HIGHLIGHTS

- The year started with the department expanding its community engagement efforts by establishing “Coffee with a Cop” events. The inaugural event was hosted at Kaua’i Coffee Company and the second at Anaina Hou Community Center. Unfortunately, additional Coffee with a Cop events were cancelled due to COVID-19.



- The World Health Organization declared a Public Health Emergency of International Concern on January 30 due to the respiratory disease caused by the coronavirus (COVID-19). The virus was initially detected in Wuhan City Hubei Province of China. In March, Governor David Ige and Mayor Derek Kawakami issued Emergency Proclamations in an effort to safeguard the residents and visitors of Hawai’i from the COVID-19 pandemic.

COVID-19 had a major impact on KPD’s operations. In addition to being tasked with normal policing duties, officers and civilians participated in various COVID-19 operations. KPD, along with assistance from Hawai’i National Guard, were tasked to enforce stay-at-home orders, curfew violations, and to conduct quarantine compliance checks. Some KPD employees were redirected from normal duties, i.e. School Resource Officer, to managing the screening of all arriving airport passengers in an effort to curb the spread of COVID-19.

In response to the CDC’s safety protocols related to COVID-19, KPD developed new policies and procedures to reduce the potential exposure of staff to the virus by reducing unnecessary staff-community face-to-face contact. An online reporting system to allow citizen to make complaints and report crimes,

depending on the severity, was implemented. KPD records section developed online request forms to process record, UIPA and firearms requests.



- Upon Covid-19 being declared an emergency in Hawai'i, it changed how KPD participated in community engagement. Despite the challenges the pandemic placed on the department the department still found ways to stay engaged with the community with the creation of Police, Pastors and Pancakes, as well as participating in Kūpuna Lunch Distribution, contactless award ceremonies for Special Olympics, No Shave November Cancer Awareness, New Hope food distribution, Salvation Army Angel Tree and Operation Kūpuna Stocking projects.



- KPD received a law enforcement reaccreditation award that is considered the "Gold Standard in Public Safety" from the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies (CALEA®) on November 13. This prestigious international award recognizes professional excellence in law enforcement and is only granted to police departments that choose to undergo an accreditation process in which all criteria for management, safety, and service and delivery must be demonstrated.

KPD was required to comply with nearly 200 standards and files that are reviewed by CALEA® Compliance Service Members on an annual basis. Moreover, in June, two assessors from CALEA® examined all aspects of KPD policy and procedures, management, operations, and support services to ensure compliance with established standards. The team of two were able to verify that KPD was, indeed, in compliance with all applicable standards and they submitted a report of their findings to the CALEA® Commission.

On November 12, Chief of Police Todd G. Raybuck and the KPD accreditation team appeared before the CALEA® Commission Review Committee and the Commission approved the reaccreditation of KPD, which is held for four years.

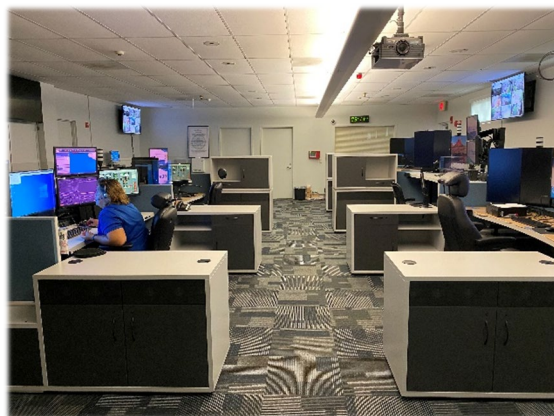


- KPD welcomed a new coordinator for the Crime Stoppers Kaua'i program. Their duties include managing the anonymous tip system, community outreach activities, and communicating with state and regional Crime Stoppers' leadership. Crime Stoppers Kaua'i is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit which amped up its efforts in 2018 by incorporating and forming a board of directors so that more community members could feel comfortable reporting criminal activity by maintaining anonymity.
- In an effort to provide more wellness resources to KPD staff and their families the department worked with CORDICO, a public safety health and wellness company, to develop a customized app with various wellness resources. The app was distributed through the department and provides confidential 24/7 access to a variety of resources, including:
 - * "Tap to Call": immediate access to KPD Peer Support, Hawai'i Crisis Line, Copline, Suicide Prevention Hotline, and the Crisis Text Line.
 - * Officer Wellness Toolkit: access to more than 30 modules providing a comprehensive list of resources including confidential self-assessment tools, signs and symptoms, health and wellness strategies, and work-life balance tools.
 - * Health and wellness programs, Therapist information, Chaplain Support, Guided Meditations, fitness, nutrition, injury prevention, and additional resources.

- KPD joined Hawai'i Police Department and the Maui Police Department in forming the first-ever Hawai'i Interisland Bomb Squad (HIBS). The HIBS received certification by U.S. Department of Justice, Federal Bureau of Investigation Hazardous Devices School and has met the requirements for equipment and training set forth by the National Bomb Squad Commanders Advisory Board. As part of the HIBS, specially trained officers from KPD's Investigative Services Bureau have taken on the advanced task of becoming certified bomb technicians. HIBS is responsible for responding to all accidental explosions, bombings, explosives, military ordnances, and other related hazardous materials on the island.



- KPD dispatchers moved into a newly renovated Communications Center at the Līhu'e Headquarters. The \$178,000 renovation, made possible by funds from the State 911 Board, included new flooring, new dispatcher consoles, a fresh coat of paint and a new video wall system.
